Proposal: As NMSU wrestles with the budget realignment exercise, members of the NMSU Faculty Senate make the following statement to NMSU's Central Administration:

Whereas, efforts by NMSU to achieve Carnegie R01 research status and advance LEADS 2025 Goal #2, Elevate Research and Creativity, require a robust and sustainable research Library;

Whereas, the NMSU Library has historically supported STEM resources to the detriment of the same in the Social Sciences and Humanities, yet NMSU must now expand research in the Social Sciences and Humanities to achieve Carnegie R01 status;

Whereas, the current budget for the NMSU Library is insufficient to sustain even the most basic of research activities, much less support the research efforts needed to achieve R01 status and support LEADS 2025; and

Whereas, any further reductions in the Library budget will compromise NMSU's ability to support InterLibrary Loan (ILL) activity that partially offsets the burden NMSU's limited holdings presents to NMSU research activities.

Therefore, on this 3rd day of December 2020, the NMSU Faculty Senate formally requests that NMSU's Central Administration act on the following requests.

Not to propose or act upon further reductions to the Library budget.

- Add the funding needed to support NMSU's efforts to achieve R01 status and advance LEADS 2025 to current and future NMSU budgets. The attached table shows NMSU ranks toward the bottom relative to its peer institutions in dollars spent on materials budget per student FTE and dollars spent on materials budget per faculty FTE.
- Increase funding for the NMSU Library's materials budget to the median of peer institutions on the previously mentioned metrics. Detailed data on peers are below.
